The 15th Medical Group at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam will welcome inspectors Sept. 19, and to prepare for their major inspection they're doing ... everything they normally do.

Health services inspectors from the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care and the Air Force Inspection Agency will spend a week thoroughly reviewing all the medical group's regular healthcare practices, plans and procedures, quizzing everyone from the newest Airmen right up to the newest Shipmen. The 15th Medical Group is ready and confident.

"Our mission is to provide world-class, patient-centered medical to America's heroes and their families in the Pacific and abroad," said Lt. Col. Marlene Kerchenski, 15th Medical Group chief nurse. "We touch every organization on base."

Recent success for the medical group includes Lightning



Rescue (the U.S. Pacific Command's Joint Task Force - Homeland's Task Force sponsored joint-interagency pandemic influenza preparedness and response exercise); their family health initiative; seamless joint base integration of their bio-environmental engineers and first responders with the federal fire department; and their

aeromedical evacuation ground support mission, according to Lt. Col. Christopher Dunn, 15th Medical Support Squadron commander.

"There are hundreds of things we are being evaluated on," said Chief Master Sgt. Lisa Jayne, group superintendent. "Like a (unit compliance inspection), they give us guidelines on how

to treat, for instance, patients who come in with (certain) diseases."

These procedures ensure the safety of the patients and the staff, Jayne said.

For the medical group, there's actually not a lot of preparation that goes into this inspection, according to June Kuahiwinui, 15th Medical Group chief of clin-

ical quality services.

"There's some spin-up stuff, like you always do for an inspection, but as far as the process we do, it's our normal business: providing safe, quality healthcare for our beneficiaries," he said.

The 15th Medical Group trains to respond to disasters and provide emergency services.

As a primary care clinic, they serve service members of all branches of the military, active-duty and retired, and their families, Kerchenski said. This medical group's mission is vital to the joint base, and their competency is a key to the overall success of the force and the broad-scope mission. Every bit of the base is touched in some way by the medical group, because their highly-trained specialists do more than just treat patients - they regularly test water, assist with food safety, and much more.

"The public (needs to) feel confident coming to our clinic to get their healthcare," Kerchenski said. "If we don't take care of our active-duty personnel, that will in turn affect their ability to fulfill their role at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam."

MDSU-1 crushes Pac-Nasty in gridiron opener

Mobile Diving and Salvage Unit One (MDSU-1) picked off four passes on defense, while quarterback Navy Diver 2nd Class Eric Somers threw for four touchdowns during the team's decisive 33-6 victory over Pac-Nasty of Naval Submarine Training Center Pacific in the season opener of the 2011 Ashore Intramural Flag Football League at Ward Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on Sept. 13.

In a game in which MDSU dominated on both sides of the ball, the divers rode the tails of their ball-hawking defense to build up a 21-0 lead and never looked back.

"Our defensive play was great. It shut them down," Somers said. "And the whole time, our offense came out and performed good. Our game plan was to keep it simple and use our speed."

Almost from the starting gun, the MDSU defense stepped up to keep Pac-Nasty from knocking on the door.

During the opening series of the game, Pac-Nasty, led by quarterback Fire Control Technician 1st Class Matt DeKlaver, led a controlled drive that brought the ball near the brink of the red zone at the MDSU 21-yard line.

However, on second down and one yard to go for a first, DeKlaver's toss to the 15-yard line was picked off by Navy Diver 2nd Class Jason Boyle, who set up MDSU in good field position at the Pac-Nasty 28-yard line.

Boyle stole another pass from DeKlaver later in the first half and almost had a third takeaway in the second half.

Two plays after Boyle's first pick, Somers hooked up with Navy Diver 1st Class Timothy Stahnke on a catch-and-run play that covered 25 yards and a touchdown.

Then after taking over the ball on downs, MDSU ended a 50-yard drive on five plays with a short two-yard pass on fourth down from Somers to Navy Diver 3rd Class Brett Mcentire to give the team a 12-0 lead.

After the two teams exchanged possessions on turnovers, Hull

Maintenance Technician Fireman Daniel Allred came up with another huge play for the MDSU defense when he stepped in front of a DeKlaver pass and took it all the way to the house for a 58-yard pick six. The team's three-point conversion extended its lead to 21-0.

Pac-Nasty scored a touchdown to narrow the margin to 21-6 and drove down to the MDSU 10-yard line just before the half, but an interception in the end zone by Navy Diver 2nd Class P.J. O'Dell ended the threat.

On MDSU's second possession following halftime, Somers directed a slick 37-yard drive that covered six plays and ended on a short eight-yard strike to Navy Diver 3rd Class Shaun Egly, who was camped in the middle of the end zone – raising the lead to 27-0.

The duo hooked up one more time for a touchdown after MDSU took over on downs on its own 10-yard line late in the game.

A pass from Somers to Stahnke lined up the ball at the two before Somers found Egly for their second scoring strike.

"It's all about feeling good and we're in shape," MDSU head coach Chief Information Systems Technician Rodney Lovett explained about the team's impressive win. "Navy divers, all they do is run, and they got lungs like balloons. Those guys are unstoppable. Every one executed and was on fire."

While Lovett said that execution was one of the key reasons for the win, DeKlaver claimed full responsibility for allowing the MDSU defense to take control early in the game.

Still, DeKlaver said that the defeat wasn't a total loss for him and his teammates.

"I was just making bad decisions, throws, out there. It was all me," he said. "But we got a pretty good group of guys here, and we're just out here having a good time. We're not going to let a score like this get us down."

Although it's still early in the season, Lovett said that even before the first kickoff, MDSU had only one thing on its mind.

"We're going to the championship," he stated. "This is only a stepping stone to the championship. We'll take it one game at a time."

JPAC blanks ATG MidPac in time-shortened game

Joint Prisoner of War/Missing in Action Accounting Command (JPAC) got three goals from Army Capt. Dan Chapman and a single goal from Marine Capt. Justin Butler to beat Afloat Training Group Middle Pacific (ATG MidPac), 4-0, in a Summer Soccer League matchup at Quick Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on Sept. 10.

With the victory, JPAC improved its league record to 2-1-1, while ATG remained in the hunt for its first win at 0-3-1.

The game was called by referees at the 10-minute mark in the second half after ATG MidPac saw one of its players drop out, which left the team one player shy of the league's required minimum of seven players per squad to compete. Both teams started the contest with only seven players on each side – two players short of a full squad.

While the shortage of players seemed to compromise ATG's attack on offense, JPAC, which was led by Chapman, appeared to take advantage of the extra open space.

In the first half, JPAC easily exploited the ATG defense and outkicked its opponent by a margin of nine to one on kicks on goal.

Chapman scored his first two goals on straightaway kicks down the middle at the top of the box, before completing his hat trick on a breakaway.

Teammate Butler added the team's fourth and final goal late in the first half, when he kicked a shot from the right side of the field that sailed over the out-

reached hands of the ATG goalkeeper and into the left corner of the goal.

In the second half, JPAC kept the pressure on with four more kicks on goal, before referees called off the contest.

"There were a lot of opportunities," said Chapman following the lopsided win. "It's up to the strikers to take those opportunities and make the most out of them. Me and my teammates had a lot of

opportunities and that always makes it easy. I think we came together on offense, so that was nice."

Although JPAC spent a great deal of its time on the ATG side of the field, the team's defense also played

well when it had to guard over its goal.

Despite having the same number of players on the field as JPAC, ATG just couldn't seem to get its offense going and was never able to create as much open

space as its opponent.

"I think before the ball has to get to the other side, it has to go through the middle, and we own the middle," Chapman explained. "We dominated possession, dominated the middle of the field, and everything on both ends were created because of that."

Hospital Corpsman 1st Class Cory Butler of ATG said that the team's rough day on the field was a result of its own mistakes rather than the strong defense of JPAC.

In the shortened second half, ATG failed to produce a single shot on goal.

"I don't think we were talking enough out there," Butler stated. "They were playing the sides and working the middle, and we weren't doing it. We started doing it, but it wasn't working out. We definitely could have improved our passing."

Still Butler said that even in defeat, he and his teammates enjoyed the game and accomplished what it wants to do every outing: have fun.

"For us, it's about getting exercise and playing," Butler said. "I don't think we're as competitive. It's more just like fun for us out here."

For JPAC, the victory, which moved the team up to third place in the standings, could be a sign that the team is ready to take on the tougher squads in the league.

Chapman, who was playing in his first game for JPAC, said that he feels lucky to play for a good team and was excited that he contributed to its recent win.

"It feels pretty good (to score three goals)," he said. "I haven't done that since high school."

Chosin storms back to defeat JPAC in three sets

Down by a set, the red-hot USS Chosin (CG 65) stormed from behind to win its second consecutive match by beating second-place Joint Prisoner of War/Missing in Action Accounting Command (JPAC) in three sets, 15-25, 25-22 and 15-10, in an Intramural Volleyball League Friday Division matchup at Hickam Fitness Center gym, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on Sept. 9.

The win boosted the Chosin's record to 3-4, while JPAC started the night with a 6-1 mark and was only one game behind division-leading Hawaii Air National Guard at 8-0.

Although JPAC was playing in its second game of the night, the team got out to a fast start against the Chosin.

An ace by Staff Sgt. Aaron Allmon II midway through the first set gave JPAC a 13-3 lead, which later grew to a 22-10 advantage following a five-point run off the service of army Sgt. 1st Class Josh Evans.

While back-to-back aces by Chosin Fire Controlman 1st Class Jeffrey Nogueira helped the team record four straight points for a mini-comeback, a kill by Evans put the first set away for good.

Faced with being swept, the Chosin stepped up its effort and quickly grabbed a 9-6 lead in set two.

However, JPAC refused to succumb to the pressure and managed to go on a seven-point run, before giving up service on a long hit to move out in front with a 13-10 advantage.

The Chosin battled back and with the score tied at 16-16,

Electrician's Mate Fireman Edwin Castro slammed three service aces in leading his shipmates to a six-point run and a 22-16 lead, before the team hung on for a three-point win.

The same back-and-forth action continued in the third set with each team fighting to go out in front.

Then with the Chosin holding on to a two-point advantage at 10-8, Nogueira came up big by attacking the JPAC backcourt with his booming

overhead serves to come up with two aces in leading his team to four straight points in a row and an insurmountable 14-8 lead.

"We just started having fun," said Nogueira about the Chosin's remarkable come-from-behind victory. "We didn't care about winning or losing. When they (JPAC) started running away, we're like just have fun and things started going our way."

During the course of the Chosin's comeback,

the team picked up its service and used it as its primary point of attack.

The Chosin's servers recorded seven aces in the second set and three more in the final set, and consistently kept JPAC on its heels with its accurate shots.

"We started looking in between their players to keep them confused," Nogueira said. "Their offense was really strong, so we had to make it difficult from the first pass."

Allmon, who one of JPAC's key weapons on

the night, said that after playing a full match earlier, the team just seemed to run of gas against the Chosin.

"This was our second game today and we just got tired," Allmon said. "Half of our team is gone. We're missing some of our key guys off of the back row."

Allmon added that the loss shouldn't have any effect on the team as it prepares for the upcoming playoffs, which has been scheduled for Sept. 23 and 30.

"The game didn't have any consequence for us as far as placing," Allmon pointed out. "We'll bounce back. We'll get our hitters back and a couple more big guys."

After struggling early in the season, Nogueira feels that the Chosin has turned the corner and is also confident that his team will do well in the postseason.

"This shows that we can play with anybody," he said. "We're going to have fun and be a hard time for anybody."

CNO on Hispanic Heritage Month: '... one American Spirit'

We will observe Hispanic Heritage Month from Sept. 15 to Oct. 15.

The national theme for this year is "Many backgrounds, many stories ... one American spirit." This month celebrates the generations of Hispanic Americans who have influenced and enriched our nation.

Hispanic Heritage Month traces its origins to September, 1968, when President Lyndon B. Johnson proclaimed a national Hispanic Heritage Week. The week was expanded in 1988 by President Ronald Reagan to encompass a month-long commemoration to celebrate the histories, cultures and contributions of Americans who trace their roots to Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean, and Central and South America.

The strength of our Navy and nation is derived from the diversity of our people. Today, nearly 60,000 Hispanic Sailors and officers serve in the United States Navy, participating in every facet of naval operations. Three Hispanic flag officers and 158 Hispanic master chiefs lead our Navy from the front, providing unique perspectives and experiences that enhance our culture and improve our mission readiness.

Our Hispanic Sailors and officers represent the very best of our nation, and are reflective of

a long legacy of service by Hispanic Americans. Notable examples include David Glasgow Farragut, son of a Spanish immigrant, who in 1866 became the Navy's first admiral; Navy pilot Everett Alvarez, who endured eight years of torture and solitary confinement as a prisoner of war in Vietnam; hospital corpsman Luis E. Fonseca, Jr., who was awarded the Navy

Cross for saving the lives of several wounded Marines during the 2003 battle of Nasiriyah, Iraq; and Cmdr. Yvette Davids, who became the first Hispanic woman to command a surface combatant when she took command of the USS Curtts (FFG 38) in 2007.

All commands are strongly encouraged to increase their knowledge and awareness of Hispanic Heritage Month through programs, exhibits, publications, and participation in military and community events. 
