CNRSE hosts Installation Sailors of the Year

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. – Five top-performing Sailors from installations within Commander, Navy Region Southeast competed for selection as the region's Sailor of the Year and participated in a host of activities in Jacksonville, Florida, Dec. 1-4.

The ultimate winner of the regional SOY competition was Navy Career Counselor 1st Class (SW) Vladimir Arias-Martinez, who is part of the CNRSE staff.

His selection was announced at the end of a formal banquet that wrapped up the week.

Arias-Martinez joined the Navy in June 2000 as an undesignated seaman, eventually becoming a disbursing clerk, which merged with the personnelman rating, which changed its name to personnel specialists' before finally converting to NC in 2011.

He has served on three ships and joined the CNRSE team in April 2013.

His personal awards include the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (three awards), Navy Good Conduct Medal (four awards), and a Flag Letter of Commendation.

He also has a bachelor's degree in business administration.

"It's an honor to represent the command and the region as Sailor of the Year," Arias-Martinez said.

"I couldn't feel more humble and happy than I am now."

The week began with an informal reception, where Command Master Chief (SS/AW) Mike Jackson, CNRSE regional command master chief, explained the schedule and gave selectee Sailors the opportunity to introduce themselves and get to know one another.

The other Sailors chosen to compete included Aviation Structural Mechanic 1st Class (AW) Jeffrey Denton of Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base Fort Worth, Texas; Aviation Boatswain's Mate (Handling) 1st Class (AW/SW) Sofia Gonzalez of NAS Whiting Field, Florida; Culinary Specialist 1st Class (SW/AW) Marshall Ford of Naval Station Guantanamo Bay, Cuba; and Master-At-Arms 1st Class (EXW) Mark Van Wyck of Naval Support Activity Charleston, South Carolina.

"Coming here, I anticipated competition, that the other candidates and I were probably not going to be talking, but when I got here it was totally opposite," Van Wyck said.

"We all sat and studied together and we were all trying to help each other out."

The top five selectees spent the week being mentored by command master chiefs from different installations, and preparing for the SOY oral board.

Other opportunities for the participants included tours of the Jacksonville Jaguars' Everbank Field and the Budweiser Brewery, both key employers in the Jacksonville community that support the military.

The Sailors also had a chance to visit the Clyde E. Lassen State Veterans' Nursing Home located in St. Augustine, Fla.

"One of the most rewarding parts of the week for me was the community relations event," Jackson said.

"That was a humbling and enjoyable event. You get to actually see living history and see the individuals there who helped paved the way for us."

SOY Week encompasses more than scheduled visits and tours; the Sailors learned from each other's wide-ranging experience in different ratings, and the diverse years of service and assignments around the globe.

"Being able to talk with the command master chiefs and Sailors of the Year from other installations, seeing their leadership styles, and realizing they have gone through similar things, has given me a new perspective," Denton said.

The week ended with a formal banquet held at the Officer's Club on board Naval Air Station Jacksonville, where Arias-Martinez was announced the winner by the CNRSE chief of staff, Capt. Scott Gray.

Gray read from an article on slow courage and doing the right thing to the assembled Sailors.

"People with slow courage do the right thing in organizations that reward the wrong thing, rising above the systems they inhabit," Gray read.

"Rather than single acts of brazen bravery, it's heroic habits over time."

Don't let a fire ruin your holidays

Practice safety with Christmas trees and decorations

As Thanksgiving has passed we begin thinking about the desire to decorate for Christmas.

What's a holiday party or even the traditional Christmas morning scene itself without a beautifully decorated tree?

If your household, as those of more than 33 million other American homes, includes a natural tree in its festivities, take to heart the sales person's suggestion: "Keep the tree watered."

That's good advice and not just to create a fragrant indoor winter wonderland atmosphere.

Christmas trees account for 200 fires annually, resulting in six deaths, 25 injuries and more than \$6 million in property damage.

Typically shorts in electrical lights or open flames from candles, lighters or matches start tree fires.

Well-watered trees are not a problem. Dry and neglected trees can be.

This advice from the United States Fire Administration is echoed by Chief John Morris of the NASCC Fire Department: "As we enter this traditionally dangerous time of year.

"Christmas decorations, natural trees and candles coupled with the potential for cold weather increase the risk of household fires.

"There are some sobering statistics that include that real and artificial Christmas trees are the first items ignited in an estimated 210 home fires annually, according to the most recent (National Fire Protection Association) statistics.

"Additionally Christmas Day has the highest number of fires started by candles, though in an average year there are 15,600 home structure fires caused by candles reported to local fire departments.

These fires caused an estimated 150 deaths, 1,270 injuries and \$539 million in direct property damage.

"Couple this with increased use of space heaters and fireplaces for supplementary heating and your individual risk profile increases."

Morris recommends that, "If you put up your Christmas tree right after Thanksgiving, it needs to be taken down the week after Christmas.

"After New Year's, even well-watered trees can become a fire hazard."

While the tree is up, consumers need to commit to taking care of a fresh tree, and keep flame sources away from plastic trees, to reduce the risk of their tree being involved in a home fire.

Because of this high risk, Underwriter

Laboratories and the NFPA urge people to practice a few safety precautions before, during and after their celebrations.

- Regularly check your tree for fresh, green needles. Trees that have dried out over several weeks burn faster than fresh, well-watered trees. Remember to keep your tree watered at all times.
- Always keep candles, as well as matches and lighters, out of the reach of children, and don't leave children unattended in a room with lit candles.
- Look for the holographic UL Mark on light strings and electrical decorations. The UL Mark means that UL engineers have tested samples of the product for safety hazards.
 - Green holographic UL Mark = Indoor-only use;
 - Red holographic UL Mark = Indoor and outdoor use
- Carefully inspect each electrical decoration - new or old - before plugging it in. Cracked sockets, frayed, bare or loose wires can cause a serious electric shock or start a fire. Replace damaged items with new, UL-Listed decorations.
- Take down holiday lights after 90 days of use to prevent damage from weather conditions and neighborhood animals.

BBB offers advice to avoid scam holiday websites

The holiday season is here and unfortunately so are scammers.

Just like the Grinch they are looking to steal your holiday joy. Better Business Bureau serving Central, Coastal, Southwest Texas and the Permian Basin is warning of fraudulent websites offering a "Letter from Santa."

Some of these sites promise a custom letter from jolly Saint Nick himself, but don't deliver.

The con artist will attempt to get your attention with an email selling a handwritten letter from Santa to your child. It encourages you to make your child's holiday by purchasing "Santa's special package" for \$19.99.

If you click on the link it takes you to a website that promises a special package containing an official "nice-list" certification and customized letter from Santa. There may even be a free shipping special that ends "in just few hours."

If you purchase the item and enter your credit card information, you are out the \$19.99. Plus, you just shared your credit card information with scammers, who can potentially use it for identity theft.

In another version of this scam, the site promises a free letter from Santa. It doesn't request any credit card information, but it does require plenty of personal information, such as your full name, address and phone number.

These sites can then turn around and sell your personal information to spammers.

BBB offers this advice for spotting an online scam:

- Do your research. Check out the business at bbb.org and do a quick web search.
- Ignore calls for immediate action. Many scams try to get you to act before you think by creating a sense of urgency (including the scam above). Don't fall for it.
- Hover over links in emails to check their source. Scammers will make links look like something else. Place your mouse over hyper-linked text and the true destination will appear, which in the case of a scam website, may be a long jumbled URL address.
- Make sure the website has verifiable contact information. If something goes wrong with your order, you need to be able to contact the business. When in doubt, confirm that the address and phone number are real.
- Make sure you pay through a secure connection. When entering credit card information online, be sure that the URL starts with "HTTPS" and has a lock icon in the browser bar.
- Watch for poor grammar and spelling. Scam emails and websites often are riddled with typos. This is often a giveaway that you aren't dealing with a real business.

Scholarships for Military Children applications for new season available Dec. 15

FORT LEE, Va. – As the Scholarships for Military Children Program enters its 15th year, more than 8,000 students have shared nearly \$13 million in scholarships.

Applications for the 2015-2016 school-year awards become available starting Dec. 15 at commissaries worldwide or on the Internet at <http://www.militaryscholar.org>.

As one of last year's recipients said, the scholarship will help her fulfill her dream of becoming a surgeon.

"Receiving your scholarship makes me more determined to attain high academic standards and accomplish my dream," the student wrote in a letter to the Defense Commissary Agency.

"Thank you again for your generosity and believing in me."

Starting last year, each award amount rose to \$2,000 from the previous \$1,500, and the program awards at least one scholarship at each commissary with qualified applicants.

An applicant must be a dependent, unmarried child, younger than 21 — or 23, if enrolled as a full-time student at a college or university — of a service member on active duty, Reserve or Guard member, retiree or survivor of a military member who died while on active duty, or survivor of a retiree.

Applications must be turned in to a commissary by close of business Feb. 13, 2015.

Packages must be hand-delivered or shipped via U.S. Postal Service or other delivery methods, not emailed or faxed.

Applicants should ensure that they and their sponsor are enrolled in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System database and have a military ID card.

The applicant must attend or plan to attend an accredited college or university, full time, in the fall of 2015 or be enrolled in studies designed to transfer to a four-year



program.

Applicants who are awarded a full scholarship or receive an appointment to one of the military academies or affiliated preparatory schools are not eligible to receive funds from this program.

A full scholarship is usually defined as one that provides for payment of tuition, books, lab fees and other expenses.

Fisher House Foundation, a nonprofit organization that helps service members and their families, administers the program.

Scholarship Managers, a national, nonprofit, scholarship management services organization, manages and awards the scholarships.

Commissary partners and the general public donate money to the program; every dollar donated goes directly to funding scholarships.

Supporters are recognized at four levels of donations, with Four Star business partners contributing more than \$50,000 annually, and One Star donors giving between \$2,000 and under \$10,000.

Forum pushes Warfighter performance, training to new levels

ARLINGTON, Va.-The Office of Naval Research (ONR) recently hosted more than 100 experts for discussions on how science and technology can improve warfighter performance-and in the process assembled a panel of leading specialists that could transform training, experimentation and planning for Navy missions and operations.

The Warfighter Performance Focus Area Forum, held Nov. 5, was the third in a series of low-cost events started by Chief of Naval Research Rear Adm. Matthew L. Klunder to bring together naval leaders and program managers with potential research partners in industry and academia.

"Today is all about dialogue-how we discover, develop and deliver new capabilities for the warfighter," Klunder told attendees.

"We are bringing together some of the best scientific minds with the fleet to figure out how we can improve warfighter resilience and give our Sailors and Marines the most advanced, affordable training technologies possible-this all about improving readiness for our Navy and Marine Corps."

The forum featured a panel discussion on Fleet Integrated Training, Experimentation and Planning programs (FITEP) to deliver realistic, integrated simulation-based training to prepare forces to deploy affordably and effectively.

ONR's experimentation work uses simulation to develop and assess new missions

and operational concepts, while mission planning technologies enable course-of-action assessment in real-time.

"We're shaping the future of naval warfighter performance by identifying technology solutions to complex challenges-and doing it with a first-class team of training experts," said Dr. Terry Allard, head of ONR's Warfighter Performance Department.

"Our FITEP initiatives explore a mix of live, virtual and constructive scenarios to prepare Sailors for any kind of situation."


Sessions also focused on warrior resilience-programs that aid warfighter readiness, health and recovery on and off the battlefield as highlighted in the Chief of Naval Operations' 2014 Position Report.

Panel members discussed how resilience programs establish tools, knowledge and techniques to enhance individual performance and health through innovative training, education and medical interventions.

Energy and Water Efficiency

You’ve heard of the 12 Days of Christmas? Here are 12 days of Energy and Water saving projects that will give back long after the holidays are gone.

1. Check your toilets. If they make noise when not being flushed, you could have a leak.
2. Use rebates to change incandescent light bulbs to CFLs or LEDs.
3. Read up on energy and water efficiency.
4. Check all faucets in your home and fix any leaks if

you have them.

5. Test the door gaskets on your refrigerator/freezer. Place a dollar bill or a piece of paper between the seal and the refrigerator and close the door. Pull the paper out. You should feel tension as you pull. If not, the seal may need to be replaced.
6. Make chili in your crock pot instead of your stovetop.
7. Set your water heater to 120 degrees to prevent burns.
8. Use your microwave instead of the stove when

possible.

9. Turn off ceiling fans when you leave a room. Fans cool people, not rooms.
10. Turn off lights when not in a room.
11. Change your air filter every month during the cooling season.
12. Install a low-flow showerhead and save water.
