Knowing what the focus is always makes getting the job done a little bit easier. From the CNO's perspective, it's a very broad view. So for you and I on the deckplates, it may not be so focused, but we need to turn to our Chief and see the "laser-guided" direction we must go in to accomplish the requirements.

Optimized Fleet Response Plan changes deployment rotations

The Navy's new Optimized Fleet Response Plan (O-FRP) was unveiled in a keynote address delivered at the 26th Annual Surface Navy Association National Symposium in Crystal City, Va., Jan. 15.

Commander, U.S. Fleet Forces Command Adm. Bill Gortney explained the changes to the new O-FRP, addressing Quality of Service and blending both Quality of Work and Quality of Life efforts by providing stability and predictability to deployment schedules over a 36 month O-FRP cycle. One of the highlights from his address was the Navy's efforts to lock in eight month deployment schedules for Sailors. These changes are intended to return a sense of normalcy to a Sailor's schedule by evening out the Sailor's family life and increasing retention rates and Quality of Work for their command.

"What's happened here is that over time ... we lost predictability in the way we generate readiness," said Gortney.

His address began by naming the problems with the current Fleet Response Plan, placing an emphasis on readiness through training.

"It doesn't matter how good the stuff is if people aren't there and they aren't properly trained," said Gortney. "Not only do they need to be on the ship ... they have to be there at the right time. If they show up after the training occurs just before deployment it's not going to work."

The plan aims to streamline pre-deployment inspection requirements and increase readiness by putting all the members of a strike group on the same maintenance and deployment schedule. Starting in fiscal year 15, all required maintenance, training, evaluations and single eight-month deployment will be efficiently scheduled throughout the cycle in such a manner to drive down costs and increase overall fleet readiness.

"The band is put together at the beginning of the maintenance period," said Gortney. "It's underneath a single chain of command for that entire 3-year period. It's got a stable maintenance plan."

The plan puts a strong emphasis on training crews correctly.

"We're going to be training a lot of ships at the same time through that cycle," said Gortney. "A resource they need is trainers. We have to synchronize it so the trainers are there and everyone gets their reps and sets with the proper oversight that happens to be there and they're assessed at the right time."

The O-FRP is set to roll out implementation in 2014 with the Harry S. Truman Carrier Strike Group after its current deployment. It will initially be focused on Carrier Strike Groups and eventually will roll out to all U.S. Navy assets from the ARG/MEU to submarines and expeditionary forces. (From Defense Media Activity)



MCPON talks future force at SNA symposium

Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy Mike Stevens outlined his key concerns about the future force of the Navy during a speech Jan. 16 at the 26th Annual Surface Navy Association National Symposium.

Stevens said the future force he envisions would be built upon strength through diversity, which includes opening more combat roles to women.

"We've made a lot of progress in that area," said Stevens. "The Navy's been working on this a long time. In 2016 we plan on putting [female] enlisted Sailors on our Virginia class submarines. This is an exciting time for women to serve in the Navy because of all the opportunities that are out there."

Stevens also talked about the drawdown in Afghanistan and the impact it would have on the individual augmentee program.

"In 2012, we had 6,812 Sailors in individual augmentee billets," said Stevens. "In 2013, that number dropped to 4,300. That's a 48-percent reduction over the last three years. Right now, the Navy as a force is 324,000 strong. The good news is there's no plan right now to draw the Navy down any smaller."

Stevens also spoke about suicide and its impact on the force.

"[Suicide] is a tragic event when it occurs. It impacts readiness, it impacts the morale of our units," said Stevens. "The good news is

we're seeing the trends come down. We've seen our numbers drop from last year [2012] to this year [2013] by 18."

Stevens also condemned the prevalence of sexual assault in the military.

"Sexual assault is going to be the challenge of our time," said Stevens. "It's a tragedy, it's a crime, and it undermines the very fabric of who we are as an organization."

Stevens said that although the problem will not be fixed overnight, he is optimistic about the steps leaders are taking to correct sexual assault in the ranks.

"What we can hope for and work towards is continuous progress every single day," said Stevens. "We're doing that first and foremost through awareness. Our Sailors know what sexual assault is and they know how to report it."

Stevens emphasized good leadership is the best weapon against these challenges.

"I believe whether it's suicide, sexual assault or any of the other challenges that we face, the best weapons system against that enemy is good, sound, solid leadership," he said.

The Surface Navy Association was established in 1985 to promote greater coordination and communication among those in the military, business and academic communities who share a common interest in Naval Surface Warfare and to support the activities of Surface Naval Forces.

Submit new application to vote

This year, the entire U.S. House of Representatives, a third of the U.S. Senate and 36 State Governors will be elected. To ensure your absentee ballots are sent to you, it's important to submit a new Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) even if you just voted in November.

Visit FVAP.gov to use the online FPCA assistant to help you complete the forms, and find more information about the voting process, and your state's requirements and deadlines. The FPCA is a registration and absentee ballot request form. State laws vary greatly in regard to how long your FPCA is valid. To be sure you qualify to vote in this year's elections, it's recommended you complete and submit a new one now. As part of a highly mobile group, it's important for you and your family members to notify your election office of updates with every change of address including deployments and subsequent returns to ensure they know where to send your ballot.

The FPCA and instructions about submitting it are available at FVAP.gov. Select your state under "Voters Start Here" on the left side of the homepage, then follow the instructions to register and request an absentee ballot. Finally, don't forget to sign your printed form before submitting it.

Lineup nearly complete for “Wings Over South Texas” Air Show

The line-up for the 2014 “Wings Over South Texas” air show is nearly complete as the countdown to the March 29-30 show continues. All the aviation acts are in place, with the exception of a jump team, which is still being pursued.

The Blue Angels will headline the 2014 show and their 2014 team brings close ties to South Texas. The squadron CO, Cmdr. Tom Frosch, is a graduate of the Naval Academy, where he also lettered in football. He graduated with a Bachelor of Science Degree in engineering and was

commissioned in 1992.

Frosch completed primary flight training in the T-34C Turbo Mentor at NAS Corpus Christi, Texas, and undergraduate flight training in the T-45 Goshawk at NAS Kingsville in March 1995. He assumed command of the Blue Angels in November 2012.

Marine Capt. Brandon Cordill, who flies slot in Blue Angel #4, is a graduate of Parks College of Saint Louis University where he earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in aeronautical science in 2002.

Cordill received his commission after completion of Officer Candidate School and reported to The Basic School (TBS), at Marine Corps Base (MCB) Quantico, Va., in

January 2004.

Cordill completed primary flight training in the T-34C Turbo Mentor at NAS Whiting Field, Fla., and transferred to NAS Kingsville, Texas, for advanced flight training in the T-45A Goshawk in 2005. He earned his wings of gold in June 2006.

Lt. Mark Tedrow is a Naval Academy graduate, earning a Bachelor of Science Degree in history and earning his commission in 2004.

Tedrow completed primary flight training in the T-34C Turbo Mentor at NAS Corpus Christi, Texas, and transferred to NAS Kingsville, Texas, for advanced flight training in the T-45A Goshawk in 2005. He received his wings of gold in August 2006.

The other three members of the demonstration team, Lt. Cmdr. Dave Tickle, lead solo and Blue Angel #5, Lt. Cmdr. Nate Barton, left wing and Blue Angel #3, and Lt. Cmdr. John Hiltz, right wing and Blue Angel #2, all earned their wings of gold at NAS Meridian, Miss.

All three C-130 pilots are Marine Naval Flight Officers who earned their wings of gold with VT-31 at NAS Corpus Christi.

Capt. Mike Van Wyk earned his wings in 2005, while Capt. A.J. Harrell and Capt. Dusty Cook, a native of East Bernard, Texas,

earned their wings in 2006.

The feature civilian act is world aerobatic champion Rob Holland and his custom built MXC/RH aircraft. Holland defended his US National Unlimited Aerobatic title in September at Denton, Texas, earning his third straight US championship.

Competing against the very best aerobatic pilots in the country, Rob won all three of the determining flights to bring home the gold medal.

In addition to dominating the ‘classic’ portion of the competition which is very structured and scored under tight guidelines,

He and his team did a super job coordinating this event for these true American heroes who really had a great time spending the weekend hunting in beautiful South Texas".

NAS Kingsville and Escondido Ranch plan on hosting Wounded Warrior hunts on a regular basis. A weekend turkey hunt for other Wounded Warriors is being planned to coincide with the "Wing Over South Texas" air show scheduled for March 29-30. Misner said he and his team are proud to offer a service to those who have sacrificed

"Anytime we can do something to help our own is really fantastic," Misner said. "It's our duty as Texans and Americans to help these brave warriors and their families adjust. It's our turn to step up with other community organizations and help those that have fought and sacrificed so much to defend the Republic."

Escondido Ranch is open to active duty and retired military personnel and their guests, DoD civilians and current NAFI and NAS Kingsville contract personnel. The Ranch has a fully functional lodge with 15 rooms available for rent, one large cabin, and mobile homes for families.

Ranch Manager GSMC (SW) Johnny Gross has three enlisted personnel to assist with management of the ranch. Staff members include EN1 (SW) Jesse Lindner, EN2 (SW) Duane McCurdy, and EN2 (SW) Chris Garcia.

equipped cook house adjacent to our lodge, with four barbecue pits, electric oven and refrigerators.

Important Items: Please ensure you bring your Texas hunting license and hunter safety card (if born after Sept. 2, 1971) with you for your stay at the Ranch. Patrons will also need to bring linen/blankets and all personal hygiene items required, as well as any water/beverages and food planned for consumption. For those planning to hog hunt, some form of light (preferably red or green) will be needed. Some additional items that may be preferred for a better stay: disposable plates, insect repellent, any additional corn you would like placed at your hunting location, binoculars and wet/cold weather gear.

Current hunting opportunities: Quail season at the Ranch runs through February 23; Spring Turkey Season runs March 15 to April 27. Feral hogs, coyotes, bobcats and javelina are hunted year round.

Lodging Fees: Active Duty military E-6 & above, retired military and DoD civilians: \$35 per day.

Active Duty military E-5 & Below: \$30 per day.

Volunteers needed for successful air show

NAS Kingsville's bi-annual "Wings Over South Texas" air show would not be possible without the help of hundreds of volunteers.

Volunteers are the heart and soul of the Air Show. Actually, every member of the staff of the Air Show is a volunteer! Their support, as well as the support of vendors and sponsors, makes our Air Show a top attraction -- not only for the air station -- but also the Kingsville community.

The NAS Kingsville air show committee is currently looking for volunteers for this year's show, which takes place March 29-30. Individual and group volunteers are needed.

Vendors who will have booths on the midway will need staff assistance, and this is a great opportunity for volunteers to earn a little extra cash while they help support the air show.

"We are already collecting names of individuals and organizations that would like to volunteer to work the concession operations at the Air Show this year," said Eric Nikkel, Morale, Welfare and Recreation Department (MWR) director and air show marketing coordinator.

"We will need at least 16 booths staffed with a daily requirement of about 190 people, depending on what the particular booths are selling."

Each volunteer will be paid the same percentage of the profits that are made from the air show, regardless of the type of booth that they work, minus cash and inventory shortages from sales.

Each volunteer should: Dress comfortably

with protective shoes (No open toes); Wear shirts must have sleeves (No tank tops); Wear head covering (cap, visor, or hairnet); and dress according to weather forecasts.

Food vouchers will be provided to volunteers each day and will only be valid for food purchase on the Midway. It may not be used for merchandise or beer purchase. A cup will also be supplied, so unlimited soft drinks will be available.

You must be 18 years of age or older to work at any booth, and you must be 21 years of age or older to work at booths that sell alcohol. No alcohol may be consumed during the work shifts. Beer servers must comply with all Texas and U.S. Navy requirements.

Volunteers will be selected to meet staffing requirements, so some groups or individuals that apply may not be selected. All food booth staff must have a valid Texas Food Handler's Sanitation Card and they must meet all Texas and Navy requirements.

DoD announces random synthetic marijuana testing

As part of a new Department of Defense (DoD) policy, the Navy began testing for synthetic marijuana compounds during random urinalysis, officials announced Dec. 31.

According to NAVADMIN 334/13, testing for synthetic marijuana compounds will be randomly conducted on samples submitted to all drug screening laboratories, and positive results will subject members to disciplinary action under the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

The Navy expects to test more than 1.1 million samples this year, and a portion of them will be screened for synthetic marijuana. Those that test potentially positive will be forwarded to the Air Force Drug Testing Laboratory at Lackland, Texas for confirmation.

"We are testing synthetic cannabinoids - also known as Spice, K2, Herbal Essence and other names - within the standard testing panel conducted for urinalysis samples," said Lanorfeia Parker, deputy director, Navy Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention Office (NADAP).

The change will be largely transparent

to the command, requiring no changes to the way they currently collect and ship urine samples for drug testing. In contrast to the Navy's previous synthetic drug testing program, no action is required by the command to have random synthetic drug testing performed on the samples that are submitted.

The DoD estimates that nearly 1 percent of military personnel may be using synthetic marijuana. If a member uses, possesses, promotes, manufactures, or distributes synthetic drugs, they face disciplinary action that could result in unfavorable separation from the Navy. According to Parker, the Navy's policy on substance abuse is zero tolerance.

"Substance abuse puts lives and missions at risk, undercuts unit readiness and morale, and is inconsistent with our Navy ethos and core values of honor, courage, and commitment," said Parker.

Rob also won the '4 minute freestyle' flight which allows each competitor to be more creative, include tumbling maneuvers, use smoke, and fly their routine to choreographed music.

Just two weeks after bringing home gold at the nationals, Rob won the 4 Minute Freestyle Title at the World Championships, also held in Texas this year. Some 60 competitors from around the globe gathered for the competition which also resulted in a Team Silver Medal for Team USA.

Holland participated in the 2010 and 2012 Wings Over South Texas air shows.

The event features remarks from members of the Blue Angels and other performing acts, a fly over of air show aircraft, and participation by school bands and cheerleaders.

Later that day, the City of Kingsville, Kleberg County and the Parks and Recreation Department will host a "Meet the Performers" social in downtown Kingsville. This is a free event that will include opportunities to meet the performers, get autographs and get everyone revved-up for the weekend shows.

Additional topics include burns, car accidents, falls and what to do for cold- and heat-related emergencies.

Other features in the app allow pet owners to:

- Create a pet profile including tag identification number, photos, list of medications and instructions.
- Use the list of early warning signs to learn when to call their veterinarian.
- Use "click-to-call" to contact their veterinarian.
- Find emergency pet care facilities or alternate veterinarians with the "animal hospital locator."
- Locate pet-friendly hotels.
- Test their knowledge with interactive quizzes and earn badges that they can share on their social networks along with their favorite picture of their pet.

Pet owners may also take a Red Cross Pet First Aid course so they can practice the skills and receive feedback. People can go to redcross.org/takeacourse for information and to register.

Prepare now for tax season, DoD official advises

Tax season is approaching and service members should begin gathering documentation to file their 2013 taxes.

Barbara Thompson, the director of the Pentagon's office of family policy and children and youth, suggested visiting the Military OneSource website for tax filing resources, and to learn what will be necessary to file, such as W2 forms, Social Security numbers and receipts for deductions such as child care, education, medical expenses and donations, among other write-offs.

Aboard NAS Kingsville, the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) office will be at the Fleet and Family Support Center beginning Feb. 3 until April 15.

Service members and families who prepare long-form taxes with deductions such as mortgages and rental properties might want to consider hiring a tax expert to file for them, Thompson said. "It's best to get advice

to make sure you have everything covered," she added.

People who do their own taxes need to stay on top of current tax information, Thompson said. "Sometimes tax laws change, so you have to be really smart about doing your own taxes," she added. States' tax laws often vary, too, she said, and because of relocations, some service members have to file local taxes in more than one state.

Filing federal and state tax returns usually results in either a tax refund or money owed back to the government. Expecting to receive a tax refund, but instead finding out that money is owed can be a shock, Thompson said. Looking at W2s to determine how much money in taxes is being withheld is a good indicator of whether or not one will owe money, she suggested.


