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Squadrons host Berry as Pilot for a Day

Walking between two lines of Naval aviators clapping and welcoming him to Helicopter Training Squadron EIGHT headquarters, seven year old Connor Berry was a little overwhelmed. His mother Jamie smiled and guided him through the military officers as he hid his face in his hands. It was a moving start to the event as Connor prepared to join the squadron as a pilot for a day.

Meeting with Cmdr. Paul Bowdich in the squadron's ready room, Connor was issued his own flight suit along with the appropriate name tag, squadron patches and helmet. Bowdich served Connor and his younger brother, Riley, 4, breakfast and proceeded to tell them what their day would entail.

With trips to Naval Air Station Whiting Field's north and south fields to learn about the two primary aircraft – T-6 Texan and TH-57 Sea Ranger, one of the base's air traffic control towers, the simulators for the two aircraft, and the

VT-3 claims basewide Victory Garden title

In a contest sparked by former base commanding officer, Capt. Pete Hall, various squadrons and establishments at NAS Whiting Field started "victory gardens" last year to foster friendly competition and help grow camaraderie. The gamesmanship has continued this year, with each participating unit harvesting a crop of volunteers to help grow and maintain a garden in hopes to take the trophy for the base's best vegetable plot.

The idea for the "victory" garden dates back to the World War II era, when individuals were encouraged to grow their own gardens to relieve the pressure on larger food producers. The U.S. Department of Agriculture even released a 20 minute public announcement instructing citizens on the basics of gardening to promote the victory gardens.

The judging took place July 3 as Capt. Matthew Coughlin, NAS Whiting Field commanding officer and Capt. James

NASWF passes 69 years in service to country

Sixty-nine years ago this past Monday, Naval Air Station Whiting Field, then called Naval Auxiliary Air Station Whiting Field, was dedicated in the midst of the country's build up for World War II. Construction was not yet complete on the fledgling base, but the station's two 6,000 foot runways were already in operation, having received a complement of SNJs from VN-3A and VN-3B two weeks earlier. The base's mission was the same then as it is now – support the preparation of student pilots to assume duties as Naval aviators in the fleet. In recognition of the base's 69th birthday, here are a few highlights from NAS Whiting Field's history.

July 1, 1943 – First aircraft arrive to NAAS Whiting Field
 July 16, 1943 – NAAS Whiting Field Commissioned



July 12, 1945 – A prisoner of war camp for German prisoners was established at NAAS Whiting Field under Detachment Three 1470 SCU.

July 1948 – Lockheed TO-1 jets assigned to NAAS Whiting Field

September 1948 – Blue Angels transfer to NAAS Whiting Field


June 1950 – Blue Angels enter combat in Korean conflict

Fall 1955 – T-34 B Mentor begins to replace SNJ Texan as primary trainer (T-28 Trojan starts to take over as the basic trainer during the same time frame)

April 1957 – SNJ Texan finishes turn as training aircraft at NAS Whiting Field.

May 1, 1960 – VT-2, VT-3 and VT-6 formally established as basic training squadrons using T-28 Trojan aircraft.

July 16

1943 NAS Whiting Field commissioned into service.

July 17

1812 - USS Constitution escapes from British squadron after 3 day chase off New Jersey

1898 - Santiago, Cuba surrenders to U.S. Naval forces.

1927 - First organized dive bombing attack in combat by Marine Corps pilots against Nicaraguan bandits who were surrounding U.S. Marine garrison at Ocotal, Nicaragua.

1975 - Docking in space of the U.S. Apollo (Apollo 18) and Soviet Soyuz (Soyuz 19) space craft. This was the first manned space flight conducted jointly by the 2 nations. Former naval aviator Vance D. Brand was the Apollo Command Module Pilot. The Apollo craft was in space for 9 days and 7.5 hours. Recovery was by USS New Orleans (LPH-11).

July 18

1779 - Commodore Abraham Whipple's squadron captures 11 prizes in largest prize value of Revolutionary War.

1792 - John Paul Jones dies in Paris, France.

1813 - U.S. Frigate President captures British Daphne, Eliza Swan, Alert and Lion.

1947 - President Harry S. Truman delegates responsibility for the civil administration of former Japanese mandated island to the Secretary of the Navy.

fire department, it was a busy day for the second grader from Gulf Breeze.

Each month, two of Training Air Wing FIVE's squadrons team-up to host a seriously ill local child to an opportunity to learn what it is like to be a pilot. It is essentially a VIP tour a police escort, with military officers as the family's personal guides, flight time in the simulators, hose handling at the fire department, lunch and cake with senior officers and more. But more than anything else, it is a chance for the aviators to provide a great memory for the kids.

"All of the pilots enjoy doing it and seeing the kids' reactions," Bowdich said. "It is one of the opportunities we have to get out and help a child feel special."

The program is a partnership with Sacred Heart that started in 2007. Meghan Kamau, a Child Life Specialist for Sacred Heart and the point of contact for the program, hopes it keeps going. Kamau is the liaison between the squadrons and the families and helps identify and schedule the kids who are capable of attending the Pilot for a Day open dates. About 50 children have participated so far.

"I think the program is wonderful. It gives patients and their entire family and opportunity to participate

in something special and just plain fun in a time of overwhelming stress," she said. "It is great because they include the whole family as so often the attention is focused on the "sick" child and siblings feel very left out."

Connor has been fighting Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia for around two years now, and his treatments have become part of a normal routine for him. He was first diagnosed in 2010. He was immediately hospitalized for a month and began chemo treatments. His maintenance treatments will continue until May 2014 about two years, and if all goes well, he will be considered cured around 2016.

It has been a tough struggle, but Jamie Berry is grateful for a chance for Connor to relax and have fun. While he thought the police escort was really cool, his favorite part of the day was in the T-6 simulator "flying" near their home in Gulf Breeze.

"It has been absolutely wonderful. It is a thrilling experience to come here and meet the pilots. He was very excited about it, and it has been the experience of a lifetime," she said.

"It's a blessing that they do this program. These kids go through such an ordeal...Maybe this can open up their minds and spark an interest for their future."

Each division will have their own team entered into the contest. The winning team will win a trophy.

quality of the participating teams' efforts. September 1961 – One hundred and fifteen houses open for occupancy at Berryhill Homes housing complex (Whiting Pines)

January 1972 – NAS Whiting Field becomes home to Training Air Wing FIVE.

1972 – NAS Whiting Field begins rotary wing training after Ellyson Field closes. HT-8 and HT-18 join TRAWING-5.

November 1977 – First T-34C Turbo Mentors arrived to TRAWING-5. (By 1983 final T-28 is retired)

August 1980 – New simulator building completed for the UH-1 Huey.

Spring 1983 – UH-1 Huey phased out for training and TH-57's begin their era of use.

Early 1990s – VT-3 designated as first joint primary training squadron for USAF/Navy partnership.

September 2004 - Hurricane Ivan hits Pensacola area, damaging buildings and aircraft at NAS Whiting Field.

June 23, 2006 – Groundbreaking held for new gym/atrium/chapel complex.

May 2007 – HT-28 added as the newest training squadron.

Aug. 2009 – The first T-6B Texan arrives to begin replacing T-34 Turbo Mentor.

April 2012 – Final T-34 Turbo Mentor flight by a student as T-6B transition is complete.

TO RINSE OR NOT TO RINSE?

Distracted Driving

Distracted driving is a dangerous habit. Each year, thousands of people are killed and hundreds of thousands are injured in accidents caused by distracted drivers. NAS Whiting Field Cell Phone policy prohibits motor vehicle operators driving onboard the installation from using cell phones and texting while operating a vehicle on the base. Hands-free devices are mandatory and walkie-talkie cell phones are not considered hands-free.

Distractions include texting, talking on the phone, eating, and engaging in other activities that take your attention away from the road.

Why are these behaviors so dangerous? Sending or reading a text message, for example, takes your eyes off the road for just under 5 seconds. At 55 mph, that would be like driving the length of a football field while blindfolded.
